Comparing and Contrasting


Comparing and contrasting is a very important skill that we use to understand what we have read. We can compare and contrast many different topics within a story or even between two stories that we have read.

Contrast	What is <u>different</u> between two or more topics.		


Comparing and Contrasting Non-Fiction Texts

Setting



When comparing two settings think of the following:

- How is the **place** different / the same?
- How is the **time** different / the same?
- How does the **setting change** differently / the same?

Compare and contrast the PLACE and TIME and CHANGE

Conflict



When comparing two conflicts think of the following:

- How are the types of conflict different / the same?
- How are the **people** in the conflict different / the same?
- How are the **resolutions** different / the same?
